So, it was hard to see grandma during this time and keep her safe.

At Christmas time of 2020, the pandemic was really hitting our community hard, and Grandma also came down with the disease. She was feeling great before she got it, but with the lung cancer already somewhat making her less than 100%,

the disease, unfortunately, was more than her body could handle, and we lost her the day after Christmas.

This is where EverHeart Hospice came in. She was part of the EverHeart family receiving hospice care. Grandma was able to be moved to the inpatient unit of EverHeart in Wayne HealthCare prior to her passing. This allowed our family to be with her, and she received the special love and amazing care and compassion from EverHeart's care team that truly honored her long and generous life.

Grandma was a woman who loved all and gave generously of her time to serve and help others. They gave care to her generously and served her in her time of need. Their care gave her love and dignity in her last moments, which was just as special as Grandma's smile, hugs, and excitement that she always gave us as a family. She lit up a room with happiness and excitement to see everyone, and she did this all her life.

This is just one testimonial, but I know there are hundreds of loving stories like this, and EverHeart's team are the cause of these stories. I know this is EverHeart's why – why they do their job amazing day after day, even when it is stressful. 



Patient Continues Passion for Wood Carving

t age 99, Thomas Whitton maintains the charm and smile of his youth. His hair is still cut like the young, fit Marine he once was. He now receives care from EverHeart Hospice, choosing to spend his time comfortably.

On his counter top sits an assortment of hand carved statues. During a visit, Whitton's Hospice nurse, Molly, took notice of the statues and their beautiful craftsmanship.

In one of the statues, a polar bear sits perched on a piece of ice, waiting for just the right moment to plunge into the water. No details are left out. Even the texture of the fur and color of the claws are shown in the piece. The polar bear is extra special to Whitton, as it was awarded first place at the Darke County Fair.

The other wood pieces include a chain link that was carved from a single piece of wood and a colorfully painted clown. There are also three little men, reflective of ancient artifacts. Each man is the exact same template, other than the direction they are facing.

Whitton graduated from high school when he was 18. Just one week later, he enrolled in the Marines. He completed four years of service, spending some of this time in Japan. He was also involved in the Pacific Theater, a vast battleground of World War II.

Carving wood is a hobby that Whitton started decades ago. When he lived in Florida, he connected with a wood carving club where he learned the skill. His tool set includes 4 different

sized gauges and several different knives. The finished pieces are also sanded and later painted. In total, his pieces usually take around 40 hours to complete from start to finish.





The very first piece he ever carved was the head of an eagle. The bird is mounted on wood and hangs on the wall like a plaque.

Over the years, Whitton has enjoyed the fun of entering his wood pieces in the display at the fair.





When asked if he looked forward to checking on them the first day to see if he had won any ribbons, he didn't say anything, but the big grin and gleam that was shown in his eyes let on that he was proud of his work and looked forward to the event.

Nature has always been an inspiration for Whitton's work. In addition to influencing his carvings, he also enjoys taking walks and hiking through the woods. Some of the other projects Whitton has in his collection are a kangaroo with a joey in the pouch, several different deer, a lily, and a mountain man. He also has a buffalo that he made early on in hobby practice, and today his son owns that piece.

Many of the pieces that Whitton makes are elaborate, but they are still carved from one piece of leftover scrap wood. He has crafted work boots, cowboy boots, and a ball and chain inside a cage. He also made a Sea Captain on Liberty with a sea bag and hat pulled down covering his eyes.

Whitton does not have a favorite piece, but if he had to pick, he likes deer because they remind him of his time in nature. He shared that he likes to have several projects going on at a time since they do take a while.

The wood pieces on the counter in Whitton's room are a reminder of who he is, who he was, and who he continues to be. There is dignity in every moment of life, and hospice helps maintain that respect and identity for patients. Yes, they are patients, but first and foremost, they are always people. We are proud to share their stories.

Camp Encourage



Children Make Connections, Receive Grief Support

verHeart Hospice recently held their annual Camp Encourage to support children in the community who are grieving the loss of a loved one.

The theme this year was "Colors, Coping, and Connection" and focused on providing healthy coping skills and showing kids they are not alone in their feelings surrounding grief and loss.

The kids attending camp have been through some hard, often traumatic situations, and the types of losses children are experiencing seem to be intensifying. Watching the kids open up to each other and the camp staff over the course of the weekend proved how important this camp really is for healthy growth and coping.

Activities throughout the weekend included team building and trust exercises, music therapy, creating a "grief blueprint" with paint, making memory jars, a Q&A session with a panel of experts, and a scavenger hunt. There was also time for the

kids to run around and play and form friendships with each other.

It takes a large group of volunteers to make this event a success. Throughout the volunteer training process, the helpers were reminded that we can't simply "fix" grief, but we can walk alongside it be there for support. Grief is not just something you get over; you learn to grow around it.

Children grieve differently than adults and Camp Encourage creates a safe place for them to be themselves and share their feelings as they choose. It is a long-standing staple in the community with over 20 years of supporting children. The Camp Encourage team included music therapists, a chaplain, nurses, a social worker, and support staff and volunteers. ntering Isabel Culbertson's home feels just like walking into a professional art gallery. Her walls are perfectly lined and organized with images of flowers, models, pets, and landscapes. While the collection of paintings is very different, they lend a cozy feeling to her home with the same warm-toned colors.

An artist for most of her life, Isabel shared that her favorite style is painting still-life items or models. She thinks she has completed over 133 paintings over the years. When asked what her favorite thing to paint is,

she quickly responded, "Nudes. My father was also an artist and liked to paint nude portraits. When he passed, the only painting I wanted from his collection was of a breast. My stepmother would not let me have it, so

I told myself right then that I was going to teach myself to paint, and I was going to be damn good at it."

The use of nude models in art is considered an academic classification. In fact, many art historians consider it one of the most important subjects in the history of Western art. For the Ancient Greeks, nudity in art was an expression of integrity. They viewed the body and spirit as fully entwined. The nude in Greek art held a moral component as it was believed to represent the highest form of virtue and honesty, and therefore was not viewed as obscene. Even the athletes in the original Greek Olympic games competed in the nude. Earlier civilizations related the nude to the likeness of mother earth and as a sign of fertility.

While some may shy away from this genre of artwork, Isabel is very proud of the portraits of models she's painted and shared a special memory associated with her favorite painting of her father's that inspired her future love for painting. Isabel laughed, saying, "My father had that painting hung up right over our dining room table. People would ask him all the time why he liked it so much. He always responded, "Because it reminds me of my first supper."

Isabel attended art classes all over the country, learning from many different artists. During her training, she was taught to paint the same image 10-100 times, as the more you paint it, the better you are. Isabel accomplished this training with her many paintings of the famous artist Frieda Kahlo. Isabel stated, "I don't like her work, but she's an interesting character. I've done like 35 pictures of Frieda." But when asked what her favorite painting she's created is, she will point you towards the kitchen to a large canvas centered on





the wall of a rooster and basket filled with bright yellow sunflowers, "It's one of the best ones I've done."

Art is not the only hobby Isabel is passionate about. She grew up in Anderson, Indiana, and she and her family would attend Indy car races quite often. However, she particularly likes foreign and grand prix cars and even had the opportunity to participate in the 24-Hour Le Mans race in France, where she helped keep time as part of a pit crew. Isabel smiled as she shared, "That was as close as I've ever gotten to being a jet setter."

"When we were leaving for the trip, we were pulling out of the driveway saying goodbye to Dave, my husband, and Barb said, "Thank you, Dave, for letting her drive out with me," and he replied, "She hasn't asked me yet."

Isabel has long supported EverHeart Hospice since her husband of 34 years, David Culbertson, utilized their hospice services. After he passed, Isabel knew she wanted to become more involved with the non-profit, as she believed in their mission and the care they provide to those nearing the end of life. She joined the EverHeart Hospice Women's Giving Circle in 2019 and has since contributed to many new programs that wouldn't have been possible without this additional funding given each year to the organization.

While Culbertson may not paint as much as she once did, her love for art and the pieces surrounding her is still very much evident: "Whoever lives in my house after me will have their work cut out for them with all the nails in the wall. But I appreciate all the paintings I've done and collected too much to have them sitting in a corner. I want them out so I can enjoy them." She hopes to regain some strength in the coming weeks to work on her art once more and possibly attend a painting class at Memorial Hall again.

Isabel chooses to remain in her own home as long as possible and appreciates the support she receives from her entire care team at EverHeart Hospice, now as a patient herself.

The care they provide each week enables her to maintain her independence through this next stage in her life. "I like the concept of hospice. I like everybody so far. It is a good cause, and I plan to continue contributing to the Women's Giving Circle."

Isabel enjoyed reflecting on her adventures in a life filled with art and travel. She did insist on one piece of advice that she wanted young adults to take to heart, "Travel now while you can. Try to go as much as you can."



- Volunteering at community events including Coldwater's Hometown Holidays and area county fairs














